DEAR PARENTS

Over my time as Principal of St John's College I have become increasingly aware that it is not just the boys that learn, there are connections and links for all of us involved in our community and we all learn together. At times our experiences as members of the community at St John's mirrors that of our young men as they journey through our school.

If you are a parent who has an older boy with us, or perhaps have a son who has already graduated, you will be acutely aware of how much they mature and grow over their time at St John's. In a similar way we all learn and grow through our interactions at St John's, be that as parents, teachers, or interacting with the school in the wider community. Students learn from great teachers, great teachers in turn learn with, and from, their students, and as parents we learn life's richest and most important lessons from our children.

I am not ashamed to say that I have grown with my role. In my first year as Principal I was in essence a year nine, nervous on day one at the powhiri and just like many other year nines, my Mum was in the audience to support me. St John's has made me a better person with a deeper faith and an understanding of what is truly important in life. I have come to appreciate the struggles that our young men face now and into the future and these lessons were magnified for me as I walked alongside my own son, not just as a Principal but also as a parent through his time at St John's.

St John's men make mates for life and they will always have a place they belong to and people they can turn to in times of need. I have been privileged to find my place, a community that I can call my own and a place that I feel I can contribute.

We rightly focus on the education and growth of our sons in our College, however as the adult community we should from time to time reflect on what St John's College means for us and our own families. If we are not engaging as we could then not only are our sons missing out but we are also the poorer for it.

We are fortunate to be part of the St John's community, but we all have a role to play in ensuring that we remain true to our mission of preparing fine young men for life in the Catholic faith. If we are no more than a place to go to school, then we have failed. Strong links with an authentic community enables us all to grow as individuals and as a community. For this we should be grateful.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CATHOLIC CHARACTER

Around 1225 St Maher coined the phrase, "Time and tide wait for no man". Observing how quickly this term has passed us by, I would state that never a truer word was spoken. This course leads the participants into a deeper understanding of our Marist spirituality.

In August, Brendan Malone spoke to our Y9's and Y10's about Pornography and Human Dignity. The talks were both humorous and thought provoking. Underlying the talks was the very important message of how easily our world promotes the objectification of people, and how important it is for us to live out our own personal dignity and to recognise the personal dignity of all other people.

These themes were followed up when Hayden Miller organised 'Attitude Presentations' to speak to all our Year Groups for 45 minutes each on a variety of subjects that covered Sexuality, Mental Health, Choices and Addictions.

On the 9th of September a number of our students and staff participated in and were present for the Miha Maori Mass celebrated by Bishop Steve in the Cathedral. A big thanks must go to Susan Brebner of Sacred Heart Girls College for organising this.

To end the term we had the Y13 retreats which ran from the 17th – 21st September. These retreats, led by our own staff, are a very special farewell for the Y13's as they prepare to leave St John's College forever as pupils and move into the esteemed and dizzying heights of being Old Boys.

ROLL INCREASE TO 925

The Board is pleased to announce that a roll increase to 925 students has been approved by the Ministry of Education. The College applied for this on the basis of very high demand for places, and we were in the difficult position of turning away Catholic families earlier this year. The College has now offered an additional 30 places to Year 9's for 2019, and will absorb another 20 new students in other year groups, taking next year's roll to 800. This will steadily grow over the next 3-5 years to reach our cap.

The Board congratulates our Principal Mr Shane Tong and all of the teachers and support staff for the quality work they do, day in and day out, to make St John's College the first choice for our young Catholic men. The Board also acknowledges the support of the Bishop and Diocese who have committed the necessary funding for this growth.

Towards the end of Term 2 12OED went on an excursion to the Horahora domain to complete a rafting/orienteering unit. The trip was a chance at 4 credits providing that we could build a raft that would hold up to navigating the set orienteering course and wouldn't fall apart when it came to flipping them at the end. EXCEPTIONAL SCIENCE FAIR ENTRIES

That's what the judges said about the St John's entries this year. Fifteen Year 10's researched a dizzying array of topics and presented their findings in that very standard Science Fair format- the Presentation Board.

Will Benefield spent many hours making frozen ice blocks with different mixtures and melting them with a hair dryer. The surprising result was that salted ice melted the fastest.

Pieter Pape spent many hours heating rocks and metal and putting them into a water bath to measure the temperature rise. His calculations

show categorically that metal of the same heat content allows the cooking of more food per hangi as it takes up less space.

Boston Haddon and Josh McWilliam used a drone to survey the Alexandra Redoubt at Pirongia more accurately than the last survey in 1984. The archaeologist who last dug there 20 years ago was astonished with the model and the two students are likely to be doing more archaeology over Christmas.

All the young men who entered deserve our congratulations - they have the wit to be curious about the world around them.

And he's right the team had strong victories against St John's College (Hastings) and Te Aute (Hawkes Bay), demonstrating improved strength and ability to compete and score. These wins relieved some pressure and provided some much needed confidence for their final game against Fielding High.

Fielding are an impressive side, rated as one of the top ten teams in the country. Our boys played their best game of the season, applying pressure throughout the first half to create two real scoring chances but just couldn't nail any points. The half-time score was 7-0 down, and Fielding lifted in the second half, breaking our line more often to win comfortably.

"We'll be much better placed to match those CNI teams next year, because we now have a core of players who know what to expect and understand the demands of this premier competition" says Mr Ross with confidence. The season ended on a high note with a convincing win 34-17 against Aquinas College, and we retained the Ray Scott Trophy.

Players and coaching staff have completed a season review, and each player has received feedback on their performance, strengths and areas to improve. New coaching team Milton Ross and Phil Mourits now have the benefit of an offseason to plan and prepare. You may think the season's over, but there's no time to rest - off season weight training starts in Term 4 for those players keen to be selected next year!

The College is proud of our 1st XV players - as an inexperienced side at this level, they faced some very tough challenges with determination, grit, flair when the game allowed, and at all times great sportsmanship. A comfortable win against Gisborne Boys High in the quarterfinals saw the Eagles progress to a tough semi-final challenge against Tauranga Boys High.

While St John's always had their nose in front in this match we never built up a comfortable buffer. Scores were tight throughout, but our boys held their composure in the final minutes to beat Tauranga with a margin of 5 points. It's not often we single out individuals in a team sport but Simon Lafaele was simply outstanding in this semifinal - strong under the hoop at both ends of the court and he played virtually every minute of this game.

So, onto a final against our fierce rivals Hamilton Boys. Wins to date in this 2018 season are tied at 1-1. The Eagles started well, lead from the early stages and stayed in front through the



first three quarters. But a basketball lead can change very quickly, and Hamilton Boys really stepped up the pressure in the final quarter. MARTIN TAMOAIETA MAKING HISTORY

We couldn't be more proud of Martin Tamoaieta who will make history as the first ever Kiribati rower at an Olympic event. Martin



earned the opportunity at a Pacific Islands development camp earlier this year, winning the single sculls by more than 13 seconds. He's since attended the World Rowing Junior Champs in Czech where he hit a personal best in the 2k scull. But to podium in the Youth Olympics at Buenos Aries, Argentina, Martin will have to conquer an unusually complex race.

He'll compete over a sprint distance of 900 metres, not the usual 2000 metres, and at the halfway mark, competitors must complete a risky 180 degree turn. "That's going to be really weird to be honest, especially doing one after a turn, so I'll be trying to maintain that balance," he said. "Otherwise, I'll probably stuff it up and flip over."



He's training daily until then and can't wait to catch up with friends he made in Czech, where he stayed in the 'developing nations' camp. "That's been a really cool part of this year's experience, is meeting rowers from other countries" says Martin with his trademark big smile. "As well as seeing the Burj Khalifa from the Dubai airport!"

Martin is hugely thankful to coaches Beaumont and Drew Tierney, as well as the St John's College rowing committee and team who gave him his start and have supported him, as well as Lee Speare who has linked him into the Kiribati programme. NEW SMARTSPEED LITE AND SMARTJUMP SYSTEM

"It was like Christmas in July when the new Smartspeed Lite and Smartjump system arrived, courtesy of funding from the Grassroots Trust. The Smartspeed system accurately measures large groups of students during sprinting and change of direction tasks, while the Smartjump system calculates jump height and contact time by the precise measurement of flight time once an athlete leaves and returns to the mat. The margin of human error when using a stopwatch to measure speed can often exceed the level of improvement students may make between testing sessions, which can lead to misinterpretation of the effectiveness of the program. So, using this advanced sport science technology can ensure our athletes and coaches know exactly what's happening and what they need to do to continue improving. These state-of-the-art tools are being used in the Athlete Development Programme and PE curriculum to monitor speed and expose the athletes to groundbreaking sport science. We are looking forward to rolling out the testing protocols with our athletes and monitoring their progress throughout the season and off-season.


MEL YOUNG MEMORIAL TOURNAMENT
