DEAR PARENTS

Dear Parents

At this time of year a portion of our boys have already left to go on to jobs, apprenticeships or further training. The excitement on their faces as they proudly tell you it is their last day and where they are going to is one of those moments when you remember why you came teaching - to see young people realise their potential and know that in some small way you had a part to play in that. As the school year begins to come to an end for our senior boys I reflect on the emotions running through the minds of those who will be moving on. During these last few weeks they begin to have mixed feelings, because after years of looking forward to leaving school, they suddenly realise that they are actually quite attached to St John's and that they will never experience this place and time again. St John's College is a safe place for our boys to work out who they are and where they belong in the world, a place where they can be boys and make mistakes. A place and time where they make mates for life.

The truth is that leaving St John's for the last time is an emotional and stressful time for many. They have been told by many people over time that 'the real world' is an unforgiving place where you 'have to stand on your own two feet, do an honest day's work or risk losing your job!'. It is important as the adults in these boys' lives that we instill in them a sense of resilience and hope for their future, not reinforce what are mostly falsehoods that the world is a dangerous and miserable place.

It is important that Saint John's is a place they will always belong to and we love to have our young men come back to visit and let us know how they are getting on. And they always appear happy and excited about their futures. The young men we see, sometimes years after they leave, are proof of the joy that is to be found in this life.

To those parents who will also be 'moving on' with your sons, thank you for entrusting your son to us and working with us over the past four or five years to grow your young man. I am well aware that our strong reputation at St John's College is a result of what you, our parent community, say about us to others. While far from perfect, I believe that our collective focus on family, Catholic virtues and open communication are the solid foundation upon which we prepare our young men for life.

We take possession of the new gym next term, but will need Term 4 to complete our own internal fitout to have it ready for 2020. It is a stunning facility and one that our boys fully deserve. For me the most exciting aspect will be the ability to have all of the boys together in one place for gatherings and assemblies. At the moment we are unable to hold full school assemblies and have to split junior and senior. For young men the sense of connectedness and belonging are important and having the whole school together to hear the same message and build culture is exciting.

So many of our staff and students helped with service in the kitchen and with the setting up and overseeing of events that it would be a risk for me to try and mention them all for fear of leaving some out. The competition went smoothly because of the positive attitude and initiative used by all these helpers and I would like to offer a sincere prayer of thanks to God for them and for all those families who opened their homes to host students on the Friday night.

Some staff were inspired and entertained by the talented David Wells this term. The wisdom he shares in such a caring and loving way is motivational, and our students benefit through the manner in which it has affected our staff. Mr Tong and I attended the Diocesan Principals and DRS Conference held at Papamoa which was a fantastic time to network and grow.

As a school we continue to raise funds for the St Vincent de Paul Society through fortnightly sausage sizzles, and the Society continues to supply about 16 lunches for our boys every day. Our weekly House masses continue to take place in the library and it was wonderful to have Fr. Matthew Gibson as our celebrant in September. Supporters of the College are more than welcome to join us for mass and a cuppa afterwards on a Wednesday (Mass starts at 10.10am).

The Y13's had their final retreats as a St John's College student late in the term. It was very emotional for many of them. The Lady Goodfellow Chapel at the University has become quite well known to the boys over the years. I would like to thank all the parents and caregivers of our students for making it a very special retreat.

Finally I would like to ask for your continued prayers for the total healing and recovery of some injured young members of our wider Marist community: 2019 old boy Connar Hotene-Wilson, 2018 old girl of SHGC Pieta Bouma, and the daughter of Mark Anderson, one of our teachers. While we may not be able to take a practical hand in their healing from their injuries, we are called to be intercessory pray-ers for them. Even the little faith we have when we pray will be able to move mountains because Mary takes our prayer and presents it to her Son with her faith attached, as a good mother will always do.

Year 9 student Cooper White has been boxing under Nabby's boxing gym (coach Dion McNabney) for now his 3rd season. Over the last few months Cooper boxed at the North Island Golden Gloves Championships going through to the finals and winning gold over Auckland Champ Omid Azizi. He then took on the South Island champ beating Azury Ormsby of Christchurch convincingly, applying a couple of standing 8 counts on him. Cooper is the official New Zealand Number 1 ranked hoxer.

Cooper fought at the Australian Open Golden Glove Championships in Brisbane in August in two weight divisions. Gold medal for the U38kg, and runner-up on a split decision in the U42kg class. All this success has earned Cooper selection to represent New Zealand in Canberra, where he will box against the current Australian champions and attend a training camp at the Australian Institute of Sport. Next year, Cooper will travel to Houston, Texas, USA to compete in the World Championships in August.

VAN DEURSEN -INTERNATIONAL FOOTBALLER




