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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

DEAR PARENTS

It is so good to be back at school. During lockdown I missed the contact with the boys, the rhythm of daily routines and the feeling of belonging and making a difference that being part of the St John's College community gives you. It is interesting that attendance on day one was at least as good as the average. It appears that our boys are a little less nervous this time on their return from lockdown, they just want to get back to the normality of life at St John's College. The boys were keen to get back to school, talk to their friends and have face to face classes. Unfortunately, one knock on effect of the lockdown is the condensing of deadlines for our staff and students. We appreciate the NCEA exams being moved, however there are a tremendous number of other events that have been impacted or cancelled, many of which place extra stress on staff, students, and at times, you our parents.

I have been reflecting on the importance of resilience. Resilience is one of the most important qualities we can foster in our young men, the ability to bounce back from adversity and 'pick yourself up, dust yourself off and start all over again'. Resilience is not something that can be taught, but it can be caught. That can be through any number of activities: acting on stage, playing sport, sitting assessments or connecting with our faith through prayer. We can help our boys through advice, training and support, but ultimately we must allow them to succeed or fail on their own. In my view both success and failure are equally important in growing fine young men prepared for life - success breeds confidence, while failure teaches us humility. Both promote the growth of resilience. It also takes resilience to bounce back from lockdown, with the knowledge that we could be back in it at any time. However all we can do is get back to normality as quickly as possible and be prepared to be flexible whatever happens.

We recently received our tri-annual special character review. It is pleasing that an independent team see what we see, which is a strongly Catholic school where boys feel connected and that they belong in our space. More of that later in the Eagle. One of the highpoints for the reviewers was our baptism and confirmation programme (called RCIC). This year 21 boys were baptised and confirmed in the Catholic Church and we are proud of each of them. These young men can now fully take part in the wider life of our College and receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at Mass. This programme is run every year and I encourage you to speak to your son about becoming a confirmed Catholic.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CATHOLIC CHARACTER

Tena koutou katoa

I would like to make a reflection using the first reading from mass for Tuesday 14 September - The Exaltation of the Holy Cross. The reading came from Numbers 21:4-9 and it read as follows:

On the way through the wilderness the people lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

The Jewish people had faltered in their relationship of trust towards God. Despite all the wonderful things they had seen: the 10 plagues; the pillar of smoke and fire; the parting of the Red Sea; mana and the quail in the desert; the water gushing from the rock; the reception by Moses of the Ten Commandments; so many things that would blow our minds. Yet their faith grew weak and their trust in God faltered.

In this situation and as an act of love, God gave them a metaphorical shake of the shoulders to awaken them from their self-centredness and lethargy. It worked. The Jewish people trusted again, renewed their relationship with God and continued in their journey to the Promised Land.


Perhaps Covid could be a similar experience for us. How easy it is to get comfortable in life. We live in a beautiful country that has an abundance of clean water, food, a reasonable climate, peace, stable government, health care and education, jobs and prosperity for many of us. How easy it is to become independent from the Divine, lethargic in our faith, lacking in our trust of God. Like the frog in the warming water, we may not even realise what is happening to our faith and trust in God. Perhaps this is a good time to be honest with ourselves, to assess our dependence on and trust in God, and to renew His presence into every aspect of our lives.

God is love. God loves us so much that he offered His own son for our salvation. If we have faltered in any of these areas, God will forgive us - if we ask. Over and over He will forgive us. Perhaps Covid is a chance to reorient our relationship with God and if he has been pushed to the side or to the back, now is the time to bring him to the front and centre.

May the grace of God be with us as we continue through these challenging times and may the maternal care and love of Mary draw us ever closer to her son Jesus.



"The Religious Education programme has initiated many fabulous discussions at home as a family"(Parent)


The College has a real strength in living the Pillars of Presence and Family Spirit.

NCEA PROGRESS

Yet again we find ourselves in the midst of another year that is affected by COVID-19. The timing of lockdown for our students this year is having a more profound impact than it did last year. In recent weeks students have wrestled with the transition back into school as well as negotiating the practice NCEA exams.

We continue to work hard to ensure that our young men are fully supported with their academic studies and that has meant a regular review of our strategic decisions. Where possible we have moved important events to increase the likelihood of them running (we would need to be at Alert Level 1), this has included award evenings, closing mass and senior prizegiving to name but a few. In addition we prioritised the senior exams to be sat in the first full week back in school at Alert Level 2. It is so important that we are able to generate unexpected event grades for all the external (exam) standards that students are sitting, just in case we see a move back into Level 3/4 and the NCEA exams do not run. We've also moved the deadlines of all internal courses from the end of Term 3 to early in Term 4.

Despite the exams now starting 2 weeks later (22 November) they are getting close and it is important that the boys get themselves into the right mindset. Many of our students will have already passed their NCEA and some will already have gained their NCEA endorsement before the exams even start. This year it is all too easy for students to think that they've got a 'free pass' with their NCEA and they don't need to put in the same effort. Yes, they are being supported with up to 6 Learner Recognition Credits (Level 2/3) and up to 8 at Level 1 -and unfortunately many of these boys will see their job as done and not put the required time into preparing for the exams. We see this all too often - but please help them to look at the bigger picture. You cannot get away from the fact that exams are important. Without good grades, students cannot access subject endorsements. For those students going off to university the exams are there for a reason, to demonstrate their potential for tertiary study.

Students in Year 12 need to be reminded of the importance of their Level 2 result - it will be these results that universities use to offer interviews and subsequent course places based on what will hopefully be very positive Level 3 results. Don't forget that many universities offer undergraduate admission scholarships which take into account the quality (endorsements) at Level 2 and Level 3 results to determine the financial value of the scholarship.

Students need to be reflective on what needs to be studied, honest with themselves and put together a preparation programme that they are able to deliver on. There are lots of resources available to the students to help support them with their revision, they have been emailed lots of resources. Students need to mix revision up - a combination of subjects on any one day, multiple short revision sessions (30-40 mins) in any one day and eat / drink / sleep well.

We wish all of our senior students the very best in their preparation for the externals. The journey of a thousand miles starts with a single step!

Don't forget that our senior parents evening is set to run on 27 October (Alert Level permitting). This is an excellent opportunity for teachers to discuss what your son needs to do in the last few weeks to prepare for exams.

SENIOR END OF YEAR REPORTS

These will be sent home to parents once NZQA examinations have started (week commencing 22 November). This is to ensure that they include all internally assessed NCEA standards in addition to acknowledging the prizewinners from senior prizegiving.



Brebner Real Talk visited late in Term 2. Real Talk is an Australian group founded



whose goal is to 'enable lives flourish' by 'getting real on the topics of sex, relationships and personal identity'. Each of our year groups spent an hour with Sam as he led them through their specifically themed topic.

Y9 - Getting Real in the Digital World. This talk covered Cyber safety; bullying & cyber harassment; Sexting & Pornography; Digital reputation & digital footprint; Healthy tech use; Critical literacy; Impact of the media; How to always value the 'real' person, and What to do if....

Y10 - Stronger. Stronger encouraged and challenged students to work on themselves and their relationships by making good, and at times, hard decisions. It explored the idea that men are shaped by the choices they make. By tackling the big issues like pornography, respect in relationships, peer pressure, teenage apathy and bullying, it encouraged our students of their need to be men of character whilst affirming the dignity of women.


Y11 - Consent and Respect. The themes of relationships, consent, respect & pornography were unpacked in a dynamic way, underpinned by our Christian and Catholic values. Things covered were: The human dignity of every person; Consent; The Law of Consent; Consent in Practise; Sexting; Image-based abuse and Consent & respect.

Y12 - Love and Life. This talk encouraged students to value authentic love and to see the deeper meaning of sex. It explored the topics of Self-worth; Making good choices; The importance of our bodies and our actions; The media and how relationships & body image are portrayed; What the Church says about sex and why, and God's awesome plan for love, sex and marriage.

LOVES ME NOT

NZ Police presented a powerful, interactive full-day programme to all Yr 12 students this term, helping our young men to understand the features of both healthy and unhealthy relationships.

Loves Me Not is offered to 16-17 year olds by the Sophie Elliott Foundation. Students worked through a series of modules and scenarios, discussing the pitfalls and challenges of romantic relationships. Skills to support them in establishing boundaries for themselves, both in friendships and future romantic partnerships were learned.

Hearing Sophie Elliott's story was a confronting experience, but their responses showed how valuable this learning was for the boys. Sharing her story is a way of creating something positive out of this tragedy.

"It's hard to believe that this could happen in NZ."

"I can see how the situation developed now and what could have been done to prevent her death, maybe."

"It was cool having the police tell us what the law is around consent."

We were able to draw on our faith as a further dimension to this presentation. We prayed together for the repose of Sophie's soul and the healing power of Wairua Tapu, the Holy Spirit for her family and friends.

This presentation comes under the Health curriculum in schools and we are well placed at Hato Hoani to blend our Health education with the Religious Education programme for the boys. Given the positive feedback from students and staff, we hope to run Loves Me Not again next year.


