MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

DEAR PARENTS

It has been a breath of fresh air this term to have boys back on site. It is clear that they have missed each other and are also enjoying face to face learning. Going through this most recent lockdown makes one realise that the boys, community and staff are the school; without them here we are just a collection of buildings on a hill. When I was asked how things were going for me during lockdown I replied that all the best parts of my job were gone and I was stuck behind a computer in virtual meetings and communicating via email - I'm sure this was the experience of many of you. I struggle to understand how some people enjoy this!

As the summer break is upon us I think about our boys and their safety at a time when they have much more freedom. Young men are natural born risk takers, it is an important part of their makeup and is part of their DNA. Taking risks help them in discovering who they are, what they enjoy and who they want to surround themselves with. It is also the reason why we have heroic role models who have achieved greatness. Taking risks takes courage, which is not the absence of fear but rather being brave enough to commit and control it. I remember reading Sir Edmund Hillary's book and being surprised at just how scared he was at times as he climbed Everest as I had always pictured him as someone devoid of self-doubt. Of fear, he later said "I'm sure the feeling of fear, as long as you can take advantage of it and not be rendered useless by it, can make you extend yourself beyond what you would regard as your capacity."

We cannot, nor should not, prevent our boys from trying new things and pushing themselves. After all, they will take risks regardless of what we say. However, we must ensure that any risks are calculated and thought through. A calculated risk is something which takes planning and preparation, such as trying out for a 1st team where the risk is disappointment by missing out, moving away from home to attend medical school, going overseas to seek sporting success or simply being brave enough to perform music or drama in front of others. It is through these experiences that, though frightening, young men will grow.

It is really when boys have not made a plan that they do 'dumb' things on the spur of the moment, such as jumping in a car with a reckless or impaired driver. When boys are later asked why they did something stupid the answer is inevitably the same, 'I don't know'. The real reason is usually quite obvious, because they wanted to show off or because they want to fit in.

It is important that young men have a proper Christmas break that they are able to relax and just be boys without the pressures of school life and the dramas that have marred this year. While it is true that our boys have spent much time out of school this year it will not have been a holiday for a variety of obvious reasons. Over this break encourage your son to take well planned, calculated risks.

I am very proud of how as a staff and community we have managed these difficult times and have responded to countless new challenges that COVID has thrown at us all. Undoubtedly next year we will see more issues to contend with and we will deal with each one as it arises.

Have a blessed Christmas break with whānau and friends. Whatever 2022 brings, as a community we will manage.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CATHOLIC CHARACTER

We are fast approaching another Christmas, a celebration whose meaning is becoming more usurped by the secular society in which we live. How many people remember that through this feast day we recall the mystery of the incarnation – God becoming a man? Yet the mystery that surrounds this may be an indicator of the problem – a miracle, a happening that is so outrageous and so unfathomable that we either choose to accept it with faith or we allow reason to dictate the sense of impossibility and conclude that it just did not happen the way they say it did.

Miracles are one of the things I regularly chat to God about – the fact that they don't seem to happen in abundance in a noticeable and undeniable way. Our secular world tells us that everything has an explanation through science and, if we can explain it through science then many conclude that there is no need for God and that God simply does not exist.

But Christmas is still a season of miracles. How else do we explain the forgiveness that is so often given during this season from one family member to another? How else do we explain the generosity shown when one stranger gives something to another without being asked to? How do we make sense of the love that one can feel towards another, known or unknown to us, and that reveals itself through our words, actions and thoughts? Aren't affairs of the heart miracles because we have no way of explaining them? We are unable to say how they begin, how they continue, nor how they direct themselves.

With the Year 13's having left us forever as students, joining now the team of Old Boys, we look forward to welcoming the new Year 9's of 2022 who, even though complete strangers to us currently, are still recognized as Johnnies boys and for whom we are prepared to dedicate the next 5 years to helping become Marist Men, productive members of society, active members of our faith community. Isn't this a miracle that we live every year?

Recognising the miracles around us, with all their different colours and suits, is a step towards becoming convinced that miracles still happen, that events and 'moments' constantly take place that we simply cannot explain. Christmas is one of these miracles – not just what happens every year on the days surrounding the 25th of December, but also what happened over 2,000 years ago in the poverty of a stable, where a homeless husband and wife did their best to give their son what he needed to survive. And before the shelter, the warmth of the animals, the hay, his mother's breast milk was the love and security offered to him by these two people. That is a miracle, a miracle we are asked to repeat everyday with our brothers and sisters around us, with those with whom we come in contact with – to offer love and to provide the security of acceptance and membership as members of our human family.

I wish everyone the blessings of God in abundance. I pray that the eyes of our hearts will be opened to the daily miracles that take place in our own, personal lives and in the lives of others. I beg of God the grace for us to love, to forgive, to have patience, to offer strength, to give care and to show concern for our family and community this Christmas, to recognize the miracle of the Incarnation and to celebrate Christmas first and foremost as the arrival of God-made-man amongst us.

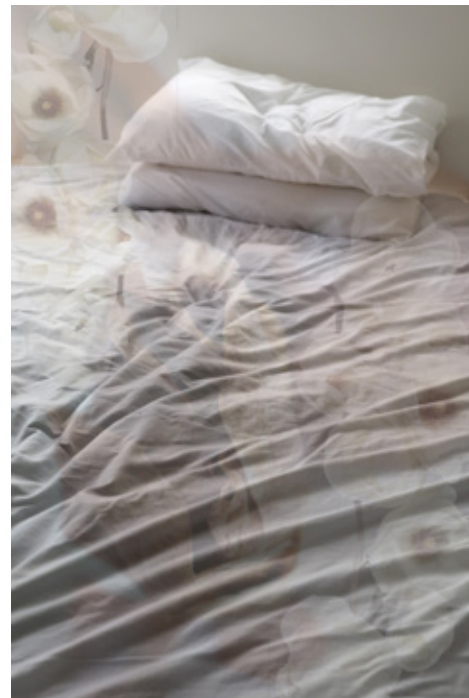

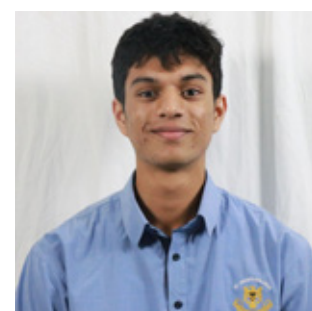
Our Library serves as a gallery for the wonderful art created by our students, and Kase's photoboard stimulated much discussion by staff and students about the imagery and messages within.

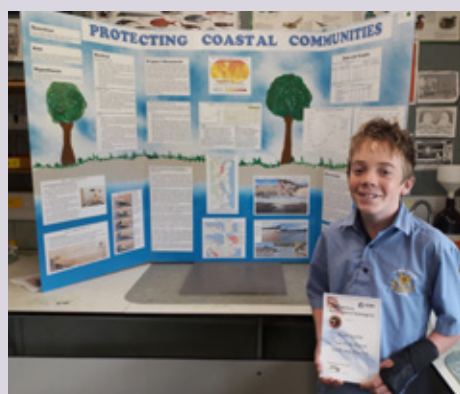

You don't have to buy from Myschool - you can download and print your stationery list and purchase items from wherever you choose.

UNIFORM FAQs

Where do I buy SCHOOL uniform? NZ Uniform in Tristram Street is your one stop shop for ALL day to day school uniform, including PE uniform. They do online shopping, run a Uniform Club, have PARTPay options, and will do specialist fittings for really small or really large students.

Where do I buy SPORTS uniform? Kukri have a range of playing shorts and team socks in their retail and online store - rugby, football, hockey, touch and other codes that play in shorts will purchase these from Kukri. Cricket shirts, pants and caps are purchased direct from Kukri.

Unlike many schools, St John's supplies most of our playing uniforms - that makes sport cheaper for parents and also means our players look like a team on field. This approach works well for some codes, but not so well for others - depending on the particular uniform. As a rule of thumb, we'll supply playing shirts for most codes, while parents purchase shorts and socks.

Kukri will bring a mobile trailer to St John's before the busy winter sports season so that parents can buy on site. This will be advertised in Term 1.

Where do I buy a lavalava? Buy these from the College Office for \$50. A full range of sizes are held there.

Can we buy 2nd Hand Uniform? Yes, the PTFA runs a 2nd hand 'online' store throughout the year, and will open for drop-in buying from 11am - 2pm on 20 January 2022. Online purchases at <http://www.stjohns-hamilton.school.nz/Second-Hand-Uniform>. You can purchase online before the 20th and we'll do our best to fill your order first, for collection on the 20th.

Where do we donate old uniform for 2nd hand? Please drop items into the School office. We're not officially open for business, but the door's open and clothing can be left up to the 21st December, or again from 18 January.

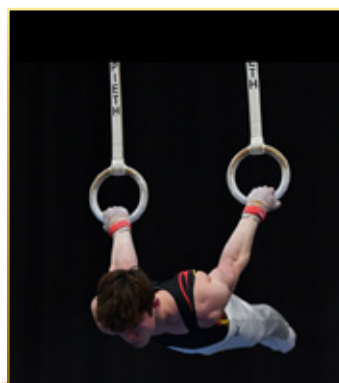
