DEAR PARENTS

As part of the St John's College Old Boys' Foundation I recently travelled to Auckland to meet with a group of Old Boys to discuss our future aspirations as a school. It is always interesting to get Old Boys together and, regardless of their era, the same themes tend to emerge. Whether it be a certain favourite teacher, what we did during breaks, or how great we thought our sports teams were, there is a sense of shared connectedness.

As adults we sometimes look at the opportunities that youth have today and are envious. It is often said that school is the best time of your life but it would be a sad thing to think that the best days of your life have passed at 17 or 18. Saint John's 'gets into your blood' and while we might look back with rose tinted glasses there is no question that our experiences were character building and prepared us for life beyond school.

At St John's we strive to provide a safe encouraging place for our boys, a place where they can find lifelong friends, a connection to the Catholic faith and the skills and dispositions to be positive contributors to society. A place where young men can be vulnerable, make mistakes and learn about themselves and what is important to them in life. We know that the media is full of doom and gloom and that it is easy to be pessimistic. We also know that young men, in particular, in Aotearoa New Zealand are suffering a mental health crisis. Young men take their cue from the adults in their lives and it is imperative that we as adults instil in our boys a sense of optimism for the future, for they have much to look forward to. Research suggests that as long as there is one loving adult in a teenager's life they have every chance of growing into happy successful adults.

The Marist Man programme explained later in this Eagle News guides our students to positive habits of attitude and behaviour, giving them a firm compass for navigating the world around them. I congratulate the young men who've already received their Marist Man awards for 2022, and look forward to making further presentations before the year is out.

Term 3 is a particularly busy time for boys involved in sport. I wish to acknowledge the countless hours that coaches and managers and families put into supporting these young men. For many young people sport plays an important role for them as they mature into adults and you being on the sideline of your sons' games makes all the difference.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CATHOLIC CHARACTER

On a recent Sunday the gospel read at Mass was from Luke 15:1-32. In this passage Jesus tells us three stories of mercy, love, forgiveness, desire and joy. It all starts with the Jewish leaders grumbling about the company that Jesus was keeping, so he, in his very unique way, told the story of the lost sheep. Jesus, as the shepherd, trusts the 99 sheep. They are abiding by the rules, are calm and content, happily grazing in the designated space. His concern is with the one that is perhaps weak, defenceless, distracted and he searches high and low until he finds it. With the consent of the sheep, he brings it back into the fold. Then Jesus speaks about the precious coin lost and how the woman turns the house upside down until she finds it. Finally we have the story of the Prodigal Son, the son who, in his impetuosity, self-centeredness and youthful arrogance, rejects his father, squanders his gifts and talents with loose living and then finds himself at the bottom of the social ladder. When desperation gets to its zenith the son realises that he would be better off at his father's property, even if only as a hired hand. Of course, as we know, the father sees things very differently and welcomes his son into full communion with the family. All three stories end with rejoicing at the return of the lost animal, item and person.

What is beautiful about these parables of Jesus is that they reflect an aspect of our Marist pillars.

Family Spirit: the sheep leaves its flock; the coin is separated from the other 9; the son rejects his family. Yet the person to whom these are important stops at nothing to not only seek them out but embrace them on their return, with joy. St Marcellin was concerned for the least, the last and the lost. His intention was always to provide a Christian and Catholic education to those who had nothing, drawing them into the faith fold, caring for them, providing for them, looking after not only their faith needs but, where possible, their physical, mental, social and psychological needs. We are Marist when we seek out the lost, when we make our schools, places of work and homes, safe and welcoming havens for those that perhaps the world pushes aside or ignores.

Simplicity: there was no doubt in the mind of both the shepherd, the woman and the father, that what they had lost took priority. Where they could they did something to reorder the disorder: search for the sheep; look for the coin, wait and pray for the safe return of the son. Our schools, places of work and homes can stay simple too. Welcome people in, offer a drink and a nibble, have a conversation, speak up for the person/community, smile and acknowledge the other person. St Marcellin saw the lack of faith of a whole group of people through the Montagne experience and, in working to right this situation he attracted others to the mission because he kept it simple, and the work flourished.

Presence: the shepherd was present to his sheep. The lost sheep wasn't just an empty number, number 100. It was 'that' sheep, the one with the extra long tail. For the woman, perhaps it wasn't just a coin but the representation of the people that the coin would enable her to help through supporting them in some way. For the Father it was about embracing the son and keeping him close, not rejecting him and having him distant while on the property as a hired hand, no different to when he was in the foreign land. We are called to be present to those in our schools, places of work and families, not just physically close but through mercy and forgiveness, spiritually and emotionally close, supporting, giving hope, encouraging and leading. St Marcellin may not have always been able to be physically close to the brothers but, where and when he could, he stayed in their lives through writing to them, informing them of what he was up to and offering them encouragement.

In the way of Mary: all these stories told by Jesus speak of the mercy of God for us, His people. But there is no doubt that Mary models for us what her son was speaking about. Perhaps it was Mary that told the stories to Jesus when trying to explain to him as a boy, the love that God had for the Jewish nation. Mary's simplicity at the annunciation and at the foot of the cross; her love for the apostles (how could we not see her preparing meals for them and preparing bedding for them when they stayed over), her keeping them together between the Ascension and Pentecost, encouraging them and forgiving them for not sticking around at the crucifixion. She and all of heaven rejoice when we live our pillars, when we give forgiveness and seek forgiveness. And in imitating her and following her gaze to Jesus and living the pillars we will, God willing, rejoice in Heaven at the end of our lives.


2ND HAND UNIFORM


NO FAKE NEWS HERE

HAERENGA - RANGIRIRI

As part of the Ministry of Education roll out of Matauranga Māori the entire staff was involved in a professional development day at Rangiriri. The purpose of the day was to learn about Māori Values that can be used in teaching and to learn about the history of our place in Waikato. Matua Milton Ross led the professional development in a morning session at school around the Māori values such as; Whanaungatanga, Manaakitanga, Kotahitanga and Kaitiakitanga and we are looking to further develop this kaupapa with the integration of the Marist/School Pillars; Love of Work, Presence, In the way of Mary, Family Spirit and Simplicity.

After our professional development at kura we travelled to Rangiriri via Hukanui Marae and Taupiri Maunga. We looked at the significance of those places to Ngati Wairere, the mana whenua of where Hato Hoani is situated (noting we are also part of Ngati Haua as well), and Waikato/Tainui. At Rangiriri we looked at two perspectives of the battle that occurred at this place and its significance to the Waikato Land Wars. Our Kapa Haka Tutors for the school Te Taonga Muru-Hauraki and Te Ohomauri Rapana looked at the Māori perspective of the war and they talked about the carvings that are found at Rangiriri. We were lucky enough to have Mr Cullen-Wright give the European perspective to the war at Rangiriri, something that he is very passionate about. The staff thoroughly enjoyed the day and we have had a follow up staff hui to reinforce the Māori Values that we are looking at.

Their practice exams have been important to benchmark their progress and to generate unexpected event grades, just in case they need to apply for a derived grade during the examination period because they cannot sit an exam(s). The reality is that the rest of the year will now go very quickly for them and they need to recognise the importance of managing their time effectively to balance what they *want* to do with the work that they *need* to do.

Some students are showing some reluctance to put in their best effort, knowing that they've either passed their NCEA qualification this year or that the Learner Recognition credits that they will receive will get them over the line. I urge students to remember that they're really in direct competition with each other and all other students across the country. Everyone will be getting Learner Recognition Credits so they shouldn't be seen in a way that dilutes their work. They should strive to be the best version of themselves and to foster that 'love of work', do the mahi to see them gaining those qualification and subject endorsements. NCEA Level 2 students are reminded of the importance of this year to support university applications next year, as it will be their Level 2 results that universities will look at to consider offers. If students start to struggle with organising themselves for exams and revision they should check out the study support materials on the college website - select the student life menu and click on the NCEA Study Support link that is under 'Learning'.

Keep working hard and hold your head up high, you can succeed and will succeed with hard work.
