MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

DEAR PARENTS

Lately, I have had cause to reflect on the sheer breadth of opportunities and the wide range of arenas in which our young men can participate and succeed. Last week was the Haka competition. It was followed by the Catholic schools' Pasifika and Haka performances at SHGC. The itinerant music festival was held at the University of Waikato that same day, and I had the pleasure of attending both. Our young men did us all proud. As I write this, we are in winter tournament week, and numerous football, hockey and basketball teams are playing in regional and national competitions around the country. Next week is our senior boys' practice exam week, where they will put their academic skills to the test. Meanwhile, St John's took out the Chanel Shield competition, which is held annually between the Catholic secondary schools in the Hamilton Diocese.

There is an old saying that 'kids in sport stay out of court.' I think we can say that the same applies to boys involved in all areas of curricular and extracurricular activities.

Four years ago, through the lobbying of the Hamilton Catholic Diocese, the Ministry of Education granted us a roll increase from 750 to 925, for which we are thankful. Next year will be the fifth year of an increased intake at year nine. There has been no shortage of enrolment enquiries, and we will begin the year at our maximum roll number. A roll size of 925 is an ideal number of students. We can still have that family/whānau environment but offer a full range of academic subjects and also be competitive against larger schools in the sporting and cultural areas.

At St John's, we don't enrol students, we enrol families. Over the past few weeks, we have been interviewing all of our new students and families for 2024. It is difficult to describe the privilege of welcoming these boys into the fold; you can see in their eyes the endless possibilities that lie ahead of them.

It is worth checking out our enrolment policy on our website, which sets out which groups of students are the first to be offered places at St John's College.

Recently, we held our annual school ball, a highlight of the year for many boys. The ball is still as it always has been: a 'coming of age' for those attending their first formal event with people their own age. Throughout the evening, it is interesting to watch as our young men start the night nervous and uncertain of what is expected of them and, by the end, are dancing and revelling in the company of their peers. The students are always respectful to staff and each other.

By the time you read this, we will have completed and opened the newly refurbished Chanel Block. What housed a dark and gloomy corridor is now a light and airy space for our young men and staff to enjoy. In the internal courtyard are six pou that stand seven meters high, made of corten steel. On each is carved the story of St John the Apostle, after whom we are named, as depicted by local Māori artist Sean Hamana (Ngāti Maniapoto, Ngāti Korokii-Kahukura), driving past the school at night, you will see that the lighting alone is quite spectacular.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those volunteers and supporters of our young men who have been involved in winter sports. It can sometimes be a thankless and demanding task. However, the benefit to our boys is enormous. Our school teams are always well supported, and the many outstanding achievements of both individuals and teams are too numerous to mention here.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CATHOLIC CHARACTER

Shane and I recently attended the Principals and DRS' Diocesan Conference at Trinity Wharf in Tauranga. The theme was - 'At the Water's Edge'.

The following day I had a reflection with my 10MA RE class on this theme. It went something like this. "Boys, imagine that you are at a lake, at the water's edge. You see, walking along the shore, a man, maybe middle aged, heading in your direction. Once he gets to you, he stops and asks how you are doing. You get into a conversation and in time he comes out with the invitation – 'why don't you come along and follow me?'

Now boys, you've got to remember that we are body and soul. We look after our body fine enough, we've got that down pat. But, looking after our soul well, that's another matter. We do that with prayer, the sacraments, doing good works, works of charity and being loving, reading scripture and other good books. You see boys, the world is obsessed with power, wealth, sex, 'good times', possessions, thinking that all those things will fill the hollow we often feel inside. People do all these things, have everything necessary under the sun and yet they still feel empty. That is because they are looking after the body but they have forgotten the soul. St Augustine, who was a great sinner but came right, he said "my soul is restless until it rests in thee". People forget the spiritual, the soul, their relationship not only with God but with other people. And so we go back to the water's edge at the lake. We are there and Jesus is looking each one of us in the eye, inviting us to come and follow him. What will be our response? Will we follow Him today? Will we put Jesus first in our actions, words and thoughts? Will we be mindful of how we treat others? Because to treat others with dignity and respect is to choose to follow Jesus. Will we give our best in each class because to do the best we can at each moment is to choose to follow Jesus?

Oh, we will mess it up but it is a simple action to seek God's forgiveness and continue on because we have chosen to follow Jesus. So, let us ask God today to help us be bold and brave in choosing to follow Him. And tonight, before we fall asleep and we reflect on our day that has been, we can be proud that we have been followers of Jesus, there at the water's edge."

Wrapped in a chef's jacket, I checked I had all the ingredients ready and in the right order. It was time to start! Now I had to do what I had been practising for weeks. Breathe in, breathe out.. I knew that everything would have to be perfect the first time, there'd be no chance to redo or start over. Within 30 minutes I started to feel major pressure. Twenty minutes to go and others were already getting pizzas in the oven and I was still trying to sort out my toppings.

Ten minutes to go. The pizza was not cooking fast enough. Seconds felt like hours. Five minutes. The pizza was nearly ready, but was it going to be done in time? A minute. The pizza was finally ready. I had

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less than 60 seconds to plate it up. I could feel the panic rising inside me and in the room. Every. Second. Mattered. Thirty

seconds. Twenty. Ten. I placed my plate on

the table as the judge shouted out "Time's

up!". I had finished with a second to spare.

The tension was extraordinary. But finally, the competition was done, and we were waiting for results.

As a Year 9 student, it was intimidating cooking in front of judges and beside students much older than me; the person next to me was Year 13. That day, I got Bronze for the Creative Savoury Pizza.

The Culinary Fare is much different to cooking at home, but is definitely a good way to push yourself to make a good dish within an hour and measure your skills against others. If you decide to join next year I wish you the best of luck."

SJC SCUBA TRIP TO VANUATU 2023

While many were winding down towards the end of Term 2, a group of 11 embarked on an adventure of a lifetime - a scuba diving trip to Vanuatu. Due to COVID19 and closed borders in 2021, this trip had been 36 months in the making. Its timing couldn't have been better though. The temperatures in the Waikato had plummeted to single figures so heading abroad to warmer climates was perfect.

This is the 4th time Mr Miller has provided students & parents the opportunity to travel to Vanuatu, dive in the warm waters of the Segond Channel off Santos Island, and experience the country's culture.

The group completed eight dives in 27°C water and amazing visibility. The dives included the SS President Coolidge, one of the world's most popular and accessible wrecks. Our divers checked out some of its cargo holds, made the customary visit to "the Lady" and got an orientation of its Promenade Deck & Barber's Chair. Other dive sites included Million Dollar Point, the USS Tucker, an unidentified WWII spyplane, the Doubtless Bomber, and The Fans (eastern Aore Wall), which ended up being a drift dive.

The group visited our sister school, the College de St Michel, where we donated essential sporting equipment, stationery and second-hand uniforms. After an official welcome performance, the group was given a tour of the school and its facilities. The College de St Michel had been badly damaged by Cyclone Harold in April 2020. The staff talked us through the rebuild and expressed their gratitude for the financial contribution it received from St John's College. Funds raised from two mufti days at St John's College helped them re-roof their classrooms. Mr Miller also met with the new

Our donations and gifts were greatly received and left the staff and students overwhelmed by our generosity. Even with the small moment of panic before flying out - one of the tour members had misplaced his passport in a Duty Free shop (!) - this was a truly amazing trip with rich learning experiences for all and making memories for life.

- CHALLENGES AND REWARDS

130ED

The 13OED excursion to Atua Moi/ Sleeping Gods Canyon in Thames was no ordinary canyoning trip. Led by the team from <u>Canyonz</u>, the boys braved a steep climb through old logging trails and 4.5 hours of wading, swimming, jumping and abseiling down waterfalls in 8 degree water. This trip is an amazing experience where students' determination and resilience are tested in the beautiful but brutal conditions deep within the Kauaeranga Valley. They learn about abseiling, the dramatic effects weather can have and the processes we need to have in place to account for these. We also learned about the early European logging of Kauri trees in this valley. Amazingly, the trees we see today are those that self seeded during that period such a long time ago.

The second 13OED excursion was a caving trip to the Karamu Caves with the team from Raglan Rock. The group learnt how single rope techniques allow cavers to access and explore steep cave networks by descending and ascending ropes and how to apply self protection techniques while abseiling.

On both trips, the boys also gained a deeper understanding of the concept of kaitiakitanga, the 'leave no trace principles' and why conservation and sustainable practices are important in outdoor recreation activities to ensure such beautiful places remain for future generations to enjoy.

120ED

The 12OED group went on a trip to the Karioi Canyon with the team at Raglan Rock. This group braved the cold conditions to challenge themselves, put their abseiling skills to the test and learn how weather conditions affect outdoor activities.

PROUD TO BE A JOHNNIES BOY

Did you know that eight of our current staff members - the highest number ever - first came to St John's College as a student?

Between them, they are covering SJC student history from 1982 to 2014. Whilst many of their memories are a reflection of different teaching and learning styles and different dynamics, the sense of being a 'Johnnies Boy', of belonging, has remained a constant and shines through.

"Today's students are more tolerant, kinder and respectful...Students are allowed to express themselves, and teaching and learning has improved over the decades. It is more student-led." These are just some of the comments made when asked about the differences between then and now. On the other hand, some of the student's mannerisms are nothing new to them they've all been Johnnies Boys themselves, been there, done that.

School life seemed to be quite the character-building experience for some, especially during the 80s and 90s. St John's was a rite of passage for Catholic boys; families were bigger, everyone knew everyone and met up at church on Sundays. Back then, the College was small. You likely had the same teacher for several subjects, right throughout high school. There was no gym at all. Sport was either

outside on the field, or in the hall (where the library and the staff room are now), and there was definitely no PE uniform or health and safety regulations.

On the other hand, by Y13 you were considered an independent person and that year group had its own common room to spend time in - unsupervised. We hear Mel Young did a couple of trips to Sacred Heart Girls College to collect students MIA.

Perhaps the most striking differences are the diversity of today's school community and the Marist charism that gets instilled in our young men and is very much at the centre of all teaching and learning. There was no school haka, and although in the earlier decades, the students were taught by Marist brothers, our five pillars (simplicity, presence, family spirit, in the way of Mary, and love of work) did not exist just yet.

Not everyone enjoyed their time as a student, but all of them keep in touch with their high school friends, many meeting up regularly. They know the fabric of this community well and the many families that have come through the school gates for generations.

They all agree that coming back as a teacher is a bit like coming home.



All three commented on the many green spaces available and making the most of New Zealand's great outdoors. They all googled the sports on offer at St John's before arriving, with soccer a hot favourite. Feihao is into mountain biking and has been exploring forest trails.

Host families have been wonderful. They organised outings and clearly have been

ensuring our visitors try some of our kiwi classics. Favourite food? Two minute noodles, hot dogs from the tuck shop, kiwi fruit and mince and cheese pies - job done!






















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
