MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

DEAR PARENTS

Welcome to the first edition of the Saint John's College Eagle for the year. It has truly been a great start for our school and young men with approximately 950 students on the roll. This is slightly over our maximum number and something that we will need to closely manage going forward. These enrolment numbers are unprecedented in the College's history and has meant that for 2024 a number of preference boys missed out on a place. May I remind potential parents reading this that the only guaranteed entry for your son is if he is preference and attending a local contributing Catholic school (and gets his enrolment in on time) as this is our policy. I appreciate that for some there is no local Catholic school available.

I have enjoyed watching our young men involved in sports in this early part of the year. I am always struck by the amount of support these young men get from you, our community, on the sidelines. Your sons truly appreciate it and as a school many such events could not run without parents volunteering time and expertise to help. In the same breath I am indebted to our staff who give up their time to manage or coach sports teams. There is an old saying 'kids in sport stay out of court' which is proven to be true. Through sport our young men learn so much about themselves, self-discipline, teamwork and humility. Our young men are inevitably challenged and grow from the experience. Please remember if you are unhappy with a coach's decision that these people are volunteers, giving up huge hours for the benefit of our sons and deserve respect when being communicated to.

In a similar vein I am looking forward to seeing our production 'High School Musical' and have seen some of the rehearsals. Again, this is tremendous opportunity for our boys and a big thank you to the staff who are giving up enormous hours to get the show ready.

In conjunction with the Old Boys' foundation I feel very excited to announce that our next project will be the creation of a Chapel on site. We have never had a sacred space to pray or celebrate Mass and with all of the other recent redevelopment in the College this will be a significant statement of our commitment and intention going forward: to remain a truly Catholic institution which delivers first class faith-based education.

We are excited and proud to have an old boy Richard Laurenson elected as the new Bishop of Hamilton, Bishop was the same year as me here at Saint John's so we have a long history together. Later in this edition is an interview we did recently.

Finally, I am somewhat saddened to see Marcel Bormans moving on. Mr. Bormans has been a pillar of our Catholic community and we wish him all the best in his future endeavours.

Easter, a season of rejoicing that follows a season of preparation, Lent.



REMARKS PAINTE

NCEA REPORT CARD

St John's College continues to see great NCEA results, even against the backdrop of national pass rates falling for another year. Our results continue to be some of the best within the region.

ST JOHN'S COLLEGE NCEA RESULTS 2023

Our Māori students have significantly higher pass rates than both national and similar EQI banded schools (Level 1 - 92.5%, Level 2 - 91.2%, Level 3 - 83.3%). Pasifika pass rates were 90.9% at Level 1, 88.9% at Level 2 and 80% at Level 3 (a significant increase over the past 2 years).

Qualification Endorsements

30.8% of students gained a Level 1 Merit endorsement, 3.7% down on the previous year and 11% gained an Excellence endorsement, down 5.7% on 2022. Excellence results were slightly below national results (16.8%).

25.8% of Level 2 students gained a merit endorsement, a spread of 0.1% over the past 3 years. 12.9% gained Excellence endorsement - a doubling of 2022 results and 1.8% below national results. Many students missed what they hoped to achieve in external exams which impacted the top end endorsements.

Level 3 Merit endorsements (22.6%) were below national results (26%). 12.3% of

students gained an Excellence endorsement (13.7% nationally). 52.9% of Year 13 students gained University Entrance (47.2% nationally).

I would like to publicly acknowledge all our staff, they work exceptionally hard to support all of our students throughout the year.

Scholarship

2023 saw our students gaining 3 Calculus, a Geography, Physics and Technology Scholarship. Congratulations to Christian Pearson who gained Scholarship in both Calculus and Physics.

Last year we had a great Year 13 cohort and we're congratulating 8 students who, through their hard work and effort, have gained an Excellence endorsement at Levels 1.2 and 3:

CONGRATULATIONS BISHOP RICHARD

OUR NEW BISHOP AND ST JOHN'S COLLEGE OLD

PRINCIPAL SHANE TONG **SHARES INSIGHTS FROM** HIS CONVERSATION WITH HAMILTON'S NEW BISHOP RICHARD LAURENSON.

BOY

I had the privilege of sitting down for a chat with our new Bishop Richard Laurenson. We go back 40 years to when we were both at Saint John's together and before that at the now closed Marist Intermediate which was on the current Marian school site. We covered a variety of topics about his journey to date.

Bishop was ordained just before Christmas so his first months in the job were quiet. However, things are just starting to 'ramp up' with the predictable paperwork and requests for help across the Diocese. Bishop Richard has some fond memories of his time at Saint John's such as running down Grantham Street and swimming in the river for PE or at other times we would swim at the now closed Municipal Pools and had swimming sports days there. But school was also tough for him, as it is for many. "It's not the easiest time of people's lives...and it's hard work when you're learning what it really means to be a man," Bishop reflects. However, Bishop was ultimately a success and achieved well. Some of his favourite teachers were Max Mueller, Steve Atkins and Kevin Frewen.

He spent most of his classes sitting near the front. "One thing I learned early on was to sit at the front of the class (something I didn't do but should have!) because if you sit there the teacher doesn't suspect anything," reveals Bishop Richard. I certainly remember Bishop being better than me in most classes. I asked Bishop how he felt the College had changed over the years. His response was that we appear to be getting very good grades so "universally the teaching quality has improved".

On the topic of how his calling to the priesthood came about, Bishop has felt the presence of God in his life from puberty so there was a call there that never went away. There was no 'blinding flash' but it was the only thing that constantly interested him despite looking at other options. He compared his journey to one of drafting

sheep where as they come down the drafting ramp to the gate; some are sent one way and some the other so "I took some opportunities and that closed off others". It was a different journey than his call to his military service as a priest. It wasn't something he asked for but he was 'voluntold' by his brother priests at the time, and Bishop agreed. This has given him a breadth of experience to call on.

Cannon Law is an area of expertise for Bishop. He holds what is effectively a Master's degree with honours. He spent three years in Rome and sat all his exams in Italian. He is often called upon for advice on what can or cannot be done under Cannon law in the Church.

I asked Bishop what message he might have for any young man thinking about joining Priesthood. His response was "the Lord is calling for real men to become Priests...young men who have grown up, and if you are a real man you will answer. Priesthood is tough but fun, and marriage is not easy either".

Bishop is not yet sure of what he believes he wants or needs to achieve in the Diocese "because there's no point in directing the boat until you know which way you need to go and where the rocks are". However, he says that the prayer he prayed at his ordination by Richard of Chichester forms his present vision so it is fitting that we end with this.

Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults thou hast borne

O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother,

may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day.'

RIVER ASSESSMENT REFLECTS LAND USE **IMPACTS ON RIVER**



- There are five rows of hukahuka one for each year level at the College
- The blue crosses in the Marist colour show our foundation as a Marist school and our sacred connection to Te Atua
- The gold surrounding reflect the colour associated with Hato Hoani; Jesus as a disciple

The Teina Korowai (Students) - Features:

- Blue/Green band of feathers to represent Mary and Marist
- Poutama pattern; Education/love of work and rising upwards, always striving to improve, to grow and develop.
- The four house patrons' colours remind us of all the men, our brothers, uncles, parents; all who have come before, us in the present, and those yet to come into this kura

Korowai were presented to the school at a pōwhiri earlier this term, one for staff and one for students. We are blessed to have these taonga coming into the life of the College.

The Korowai were made by Caroline Huirama whose mokopuna Laughan Shelford attended St John's College from 2012 to 2017. Caroline is highly respected in Waikato/Tainui for her skills in toi raranga. Jude Bartram, Head of Faculty Religious Education had worked with Caroline to learn about preparing feathers for the cloak. She then shared this knowledge with our female staff who came together to prepare some of the hundreds of feathers needed for the

Caroline gave a korero about this process at the powhiri and explained the cloaks' design. The Korowai were then presented to Principal Shane Tong and Head Student Leighton lones

Thank you to the Board of Trustees for their financial support to commission the Korowai. Acknowledgement to Milton Ross, Shane Tong, Monsignor Frank, Rick Cartmill and Jacob Kelly who came together to plan out what aspects of the St John's College story we would like included in the design of the Korowai. INVASION OF THE WAIKATO HISTORY FIELD TRIP

The Year 13 History students from St John's College and Sacred Heart Girls' College went on the Invasion of the Waikato Field Trip, the second time the two schools have combined for this

We used two days to complete the jam packed itinerary. This allowed more field work to gain a fuller understanding of sites such as the Old Pukekohe East Presbyterian Church, Rangiriri Pā, Pāterangi Pā, Rangiaowhia and Orakau. Standing on the actual Whenua where battles were fought made it easier for the students to see why things happened as they did and the decisions were made at the time. As an example, students were able to see for themselves how Te Wharepu was able to make General Cameron believe the defences at Rangiriri were weaker than they really were.

On day two we were able to make a brief visit to Matakitaki Pā to see the Musket War Battle Site from 1822. This is a battle St John's College students learn about in Year 9 so the visit was a great opportunity to compare and contrast pre and post Musket Pā that culminated in the vast fortification of Pāterangi in 1864.

A key part of the trip was being hosted by the Waikato Black Powder Arms Club (WBPAC), who were generous with their time, expertise, and gunpowder. The students were able to see and touch firearms of the period including Muskets, Pistols and Mortars. Loading and firing these weapons (under close supervision) allowed the students to get a little taste of the battlefields of the Waikato in the 1860s.

Anyone interested in contacting the WBPAC can find them on Matua Google, or can contact Mr Cullen-Wright. If you are planning to visit the sites of the invasion of the Waikato, consider using the Heritage NZ site which includes downloadable apps etc.

STUDENT CELLPHONE POLICY FROM TERM 2 2024

International research indicates some key challenges with cellphones at school such as being a major distraction for our students. These rules are designed to ensure that the learning of all students is maximised, while minimising any potential for distraction and cyber-bullying. Our approach is "away for the day", meaning cellphones either do not come with the student to school, or are switched off and collected every lesson. When not in class, cell phones must be kept switched off in the bottom of the students' bag, this includes form time, morning tea, lunch and between classes.

It is important to note that if students do make the decision to bring a cellphone to the school grounds, they do so at their own risk. The school is not responsible for any loss or damage caused to any cellphone.

We understand that some parents like their children to have a phone to communicate with them after school, students will be able to use cellphones after 3.10pm. If a parent or caregiver needs to contact their child urgently during the day, they should call the office.

CELLPHONES 'AWAY FOR THE DAY' EXPECTATIONS

Students are always encouraged to regulate themselves and develop healthy in person relationships. In circumstances where a member of staff considers the device to be a harmful, disruptive, or distracting influence or that usage has breached the school cellphone rules the result will be confiscation for the rest of the school day and possible consequence. The device will then be retrieved by the student from the front office after school and the inappropriate use recorded in KAMAR.

Breaches of the cellphone rules include (but not limited to):

- using the device when not permitted
- any sort of bullying, including online bullying
- taking photos or videos of other people without their permission
- forwarding inappropriate messages or content.

Cellphones 'away for the day' exemptions

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

If cellphones are used for a learning activity, this will be at the teacher's discretion and the phone's use will be supervised by a staff member. Guidelines on appropriate usage still apply.

HEALTH AND EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

Students with additional learning needs who use cellphones in class to increase or improve their ability to participate and learn will be granted an exemption. In matters related to a student's immediate health and safety concerns, a parent or caregiver can apply at any time to the principal for a period of exemption (e.g., medical conditions or protection issues).

EDUCATION OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM (EOTC)

Students may take certain digital devices on EOTC activities but should check whether their device is allowed before the activity commences. Usage will be at the discretion of teachers and other adult supervisors.

Please note with all exemptions and exceptions appropriate usage guidelines and other relevant school rules still apply.

THE PASSING OF TWO GREAT MARIST MEN

It is with a heavy heart that we announce the passing of two St John's Old Boys and great men, *John Vaemolo* (class of 1980) and *Paul Schollum* (class of 1970).

Paul passed away peacefully at Totara Hospice on 22nd January 2024, aged 72, surrounded by his loving family. At St John's he was Head Boy in 1970 and was a wicket-keeper in the 1st XI cricket team.

John was arguably St John's top athlete. He played in the St John's College 1st XV rugby team in 1979 and 1980, was selected for the NZ SS Rugby team vs Australia in 1980 and was also an outstanding track runner:

- Waikato SS Track champion for 100m, 110m hurdles, 200m 1979/80
- NZ SS Track champion 100m, 110m hurdles 1979
- NZ SS Track Champion 110m hurdles, 2nd 100m (10.3) 1980
- North Island SS 100m, 200m, 110m hurdles and member of Waikato 4x 100m Relay team, all won in record time 1980

In November 1980, John ran a world record time of 6.4 for 60m at the Hamilton Athletic Club Champs-no wind was recorded so the record was not ratified.

Leaving school, John joined the army, progressing to the SAS and reached the highest rank possible for a non commissioned officer. John passed away on the 13 January 2024.

Rest in Peace Paul and John - you will be missed.

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
