Message from the Principal

Dear Parents

As parents of teenage boys, we sometimes wonder what happened to the smiling young face we see in the photos on the dressing table when theirs (and our) lives were a great deal less complex, and there were apparently far fewer distractions and perils about. A time when we could largely mold and protect our sons from a seemingly hostile world. We worry now if we did a good job, and if he will turn out okay.

For teenage boys there is a tried and true formula that has worked over the ages and, while nothing is a cast iron guarantee, will certainly give him the best possible start.

- 1. They attend school every day of the year.
- 2. They play a sport, or are involved in the arts and/or cultural activities.
- 3. They never experiment with drugs.
- 4. Their parents are involved in their education and have a connection to the school.
- They are able to talk to a responsible adult in their lives about any serious emotional or mental health issues they may face.

This is a challenging time for teenagers as they try to find their place in the world but if these five areas are looked after then there is every chance your son will grow into a wellbalanced successful young man who is well prepared for the life ahead of him. In doing so they will learn the value of routines and showing up even when they do not feel like it. They will learn the importance of teamwork and that success is rarely the result of luck or individual brilliance. They will not be drawn into a sordid world of drugs where they are coming into contact with people who are more interested in what they can get from you, rather than about you. They will have role models who will not only illuminate the path ahead, but also give them the blueprint of how to one day be great husbands and fathers themselves. They will learn that it is human to share their burden, to love and to weep.

While sometimes it can be easier to give into our sons when they do not feel like turning up to training, or to protect them from taking responsibility for something they have done, we do them a disservice and they risk forming bad habits that will hinder rather than promote self-actualisation.

As a team, the school, the community and the parents play a pivotal role in guiding our boys through their teenage years and there are times when we have to let them fail in order to learn from the mistakes - we can't do it for them, but we can be there to help pick them up. Learning through failure builds resilience.

Every second Wednesday, Monsinger Frank Eagleton celebrates Mass with two of our houses. It means that each student attends mass twice a term and can receive the Sacrament of the Eucharist at school. In our most recent mass, Mons Frank told the students about the life of another Saint, St Augustine. The students reflected on his belief that true fulfilment is found in God. "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you." Mons Frank epitomises what it means to be a Marist Man, through faith, integrity and service.

This term all of our Year 10 RE classes went on their annual one-day retreat. The retreats are run by the NET team, Catholic youth workers in the Hamilton Diocese. The students reflected on what it means to be 'brave' as a young Catholic in today's world. Our Year 13 students, who leave us in a few weeks' time, also had their retreat. It was time to reflect on their many blessings through their years at our College and the life challenges that lie ahead.

My thanks to the 15 students who represented St John's so well at the annual Chanel Shield competition at John Paul College in Rotorua in August. It is a special way to celebrate the Arts, with all of the five Catholic Colleges in the Catholic Diocese. It is our turn to host this event next year.

Building our future: A new Chapel for St. John's College

At St. John's College, our Catholic faith and Marist spirituality have always been at the heart of our school. Since the first lessons were conducted on our current site in 1962, our school roll has grown to educate more than 900 boys. But one important element has been missing—a dedicated sacred space. For many years, we have dreamed of building a chapel where our students, old boys and school community can gather to celebrate Mass, to pray and to reflect. This dream is now within reach.

Eighteen months ago, the Board of Trustees completed a 3-year strategic plan that identified the construction of a chapel as a key priority for St. John's College. Whilst the chapel will serve primarily as a sacred space for worship and spiritual growth, it may also be designed to accommodate other uses. The Chapel may provide additional classroom space and may be available for drama and performing arts, making it a versatile asset for our school community. In addition, we anticipate Old Boy's may wish to use the chapel for weddings and funerals.

Bishop Richard, as a proud old boy of the College is supportive of the Chapel project. The design process will include consultation with the Bishop, local clergy, teachers, parents, students, and the Board of Trustees. The design process, led by local architecture firm PAUA, will ensure that the chapel not only meets our needs but also reflects the spiritual significance that such a space deserves.

We are currently exploring two options: remodelling the current old gymnasium or constructing a completely new building. Each option has its merits, and we are carefully considering the best approach to ensure the chapel meets the needs of our students and school community now and in the future. The aim with each option is to create a chapel that can seat 500 students for Mass.

However, realising this vision will require significant financial support. The St. John's Foundation, an organisation deeply committed to the success and growth of our school, is excited to spearhead the fundraising efforts for this project. Their enthusiasm and dedication will be crucial in helping us achieve our goal.

We invite all members of the St. John's community-students, parents, old boys, and friends-to join us in this exciting project. Together, we can create a space that will not only help lead our young men to a life with Christ but will also strengthen the bonds of our community for generations to come.

Camping, tramping, rock climbing, abseiling, canyoning - our OED classes do it all

Since the last Eagle went out, our Outdoor Education classes have stayed busy. The Year 11 class has completed a multi-day tramp and camp trip, where they tramped from Wairere Falls, across the Kaimai Ranges and down to Aongatete on the other side where they spent two nights camping at the Aongatete Outdoor Education Center. While there they completed navigation tasks and river safety activities. They have also been caving with Waitomo adventures in the Hagas Honking Holes cave and have recently finished rock climbing and abseiling standards.

The Year 12s have taken part in a high ropes course in Taupō, which focused on safe behaviour and group work. They went canyoning with the team at Raglan Rock, focusing on the effect weather has on outdoor activities and they are currently completing a mountain bike maintenance standard while they prepare for two mountain biking trips.

The Year 13s had an action-packed trip through the Karamu caves focusing on self-protected abseiling, SRT skills and Kaitiakitanga. Since then this class has been working towards their 'top rope' and 'lead climbing' standards. While working on rock climbing they are also completing a standard on group processes.

Towards the end of last term Edward Park and myself, together with staff from Waikato Diocesan, St Joseph's Fairfield and Morrinsville College, were lucky to be invited by China Youth International (CYI) to

visit Zhejiang Province for a week. We visited a number of schools in and around Hangzhou where we signed a number of memoranda of understanding for each school and as well as Ministry of Education representatives.

Edward and I were blown away by the hospitality. We were welcomed onto the red carpet, there were light shows and lots of pomp and ceremony. Students performed a variety of dance, drama, and musical performances together with speeches and artistic displays. They even gave us an opportunity to have a go at traditional dancing, making zongzi (a pocket of sticky rice with delicious fillings, wrapped together in bamboo leaves) as well as writing Chinese characters with calligraphy brushes.

During the six days visiting schools, we signed 12 MOUs. The intention of these is to increase the number of short- and long-term students visiting us from this area. We are very grateful to CYI, the schools, the local educational department and in particular, Bena Zhu for hosting us.


Dr Chen starts Monday 2nd of September and we wish him the very best for his time at St Johns College.

From learning to row to Maadi Cup dreams: The journey of St John's rowers

For the 2024/25 rowing season, St John's College Rowing has set an ambitious vision: to build a dynamic and inclusive community that excels in performance and teamwork. Our aim is to push the boundaries of our potential, committing fully to our team and a shared ambition for success. We are driven by dedication and passion, embracing a strong code of discipline guided by our Catholic values, and living by the principles of compassion, faith, and trust. We strive to accommodate all abilities with an open heart, working to strengthen the culture of St John's College Rowing.

This vision was crafted by the St John's College Rowing leadership group, a diverse team made up of rowers from various age groups within the squad. At St John's College, our vision and goals must be shaped by the boys themselves. As coaches, we see our role as "facilitators of what they want to achieve."

Before the season kicks off, our first task is recruiting new members, and Term 3 is all about our "Learn to Row" program. This program is open to any student interested in experiencing the sport of rowing. But it's more than just getting in a boat – it involves understanding every aspect of the sport, from assembling the boats to developing the physical and mental skills needed to excel.

This year, we are excited to welcome 12 enthusiastic boys from Years 9 to 12 who are diving into the program with eagerness. Our returning rowers and coxswains take the lead in these sessions, teaching the newcomers the ins and outs of rowing. This setup provides a wonderful opportunity for our young men to demonstrate their leadership skills and build a sense of camaraderie and mentorship.

Each session in the Learn to Row program sees the boys heading out in a coxed eight. It's fantastic to have reached a point where we can launch eights, a step up from the smaller boats that have traditionally been our focus due to the size of the squad. However, as our numbers have grown over the last few years, expanding our equipment has become a necessity.

One of the team's goals, driven by the growth in squad size, is to enter a St John's Under 18 Eight into the prestigious Maadi Cup next year. This ambition was sparked when this year's senior rowers realized that most other schools in the Hamilton area have regularly fielded crews in the Boys Under 18 Eight event, known as the Maadi Cup, since it began in 1948. "We want to be a part of this, and just because it hasn't been done before doesn't mean it's not possible," they said.

Achieving this ambitious goal won't be easy. The boys know they will have to work twice as hard as in previous seasons to make it happen. Alongside their dedication, having a modern coxed eight that suits the team's needs is crucial. A brand-new coxed eight costs around \$50,000, which means the boys have already started working hard to raise the necessary funds.
