## Message from the Principal

#### **Dear Parents**

As we come to the end of another year we appreciate that many of you will from time to time reflect on just how fast the teenage years go and what dramatic physical and personal growth occurs for your son during this fleeting time. I sincerely hope that you are able to spend quality time with your son over the Christmas break creating memories together that last a life time.

This year's Marist Pillar is Simplicity. Simplicity is about being straightforward and genuine, humble and modest, saying what you mean and meaning what you say. As men we function at our best in all walks of life when we are able to be ourselves, and communicate in unpretentious terms. It is when we try to be something we are not that life and relationships become difficult. Our aim at Saint John's College is to provide an environment where our young men are able to explore and express themselves, and, with God's help, find themselves and their place in the world.

One of the major concerns in education in New Zealand is attendance, which is very low compared to other similar countries and has dropped significantly in the last decade. To put things into perspective a 90% attendance rate might sound good, however that is on average a day a fortnight off and a month off school in a calendar year which is something I doubt employers would be happy with. From next year the Ministry is implementing a new programme called STAR (stepped attendance response). This will require schools to implement interventions when any student is away for 5, 10, or (the threshold for serious concern) 15 days plus in a term and schools will be required to involve agencies such as the truancy service and the Ministry of Education to interact with families. Currently the threshold is 20 consecutive days and only then without an explanation from parents. This new policy is different in that the 15 days do not have to be consecutive and even an explanation from parents for the absence may no longer be acceptable under the Ministry's guidelines. Together with the Ministry we will work alongside families in supporting our young men to attend regularly.

Thank you to you, our community, who are our biggest supporters, we appreciate all that you do in helping us prepare young men for life.

#### **Board report**

Saint John's College has enjoyed another successful year, a testament to the dedication of teachers, students, families, and the wider community. Key highlights include academic achievements, enhanced community involvement, and progress toward strengthening the school's Catholic character.

#### **Student Performance and Academic Culture**

The college has made significant strides toward fostering a culture of academic excellence, a key strategic goal. Notably, the 2023 NCEA results demonstrate high academic achievement across levels: more than 94% of students achieved at least an "Achieved" grade at Level 1, around 93% at Level 2, and about 88% at Level 3. These figures surpass national averages by approximately 25%, underscoring the school's academic strength.

Notably, the Gateway programme has provided invaluable work experience, easing students' transition from school to the workforce. An Academic Council was formed to support peer tutoring, further encouraging a collaborative and supportive learning environment. Plans to introduce an Academic Dean position in 2025 underscore the school's commitment to sustained academic focus.

#### **Community involvement**

Attendance is recognized as a vital factor in academic success, with 89% of students attending more than 80% of the time. While attendance rates are favourable, the school is committed to working closely with families to emphasize the impact of consistent attendance on student achievement.

Increasing enrolment demand has resulted in over-subscription, as the Year 9 intake for 2025 had 300 applicants vying for 210 spots. To accommodate future growth while maintaining the school's culture, the Board is exploring potential roll expansion with the Diocese.

#### **Catholic Character and Chapel Project**

This year, Saint John's advanced its goal of enhancing its Catholic identity and solidifying its role as the preferred choice for Catholic boys in the Waikato region. A long-standing dream for the college has been the construction of a chapel, providing a dedicated space for Mass and gatherings for students, alumni, and the wider school community. Over the past year, the Board has explored multiple options, ultimately favouring the construction of a chapel that can seat 500 people. Design plans will proceed in collaboration with the Diocese and a local architectural firm to create a spiritually significant structure that meets the school's needs.

The college plans to share the chapel's design with the community in 2025. Funding will be a crucial part of this endeavour, and the St. John's Foundation has committed to lead the fundraising efforts.

#### **Community Involvement and Board of Trustees**

The Board of Trustees continues to prioritize community connections, acknowledging that the involvement of parents and families plays a vital role in the school's success. Parental contributions in coaching, managing, and supporting extracurricular activities such as sports, culture, and the arts are deeply valued, as these activities enrich student life and foster a sense of community.

Looking forward, the school encourages more community members to consider joining the Board of Trustees, with elections scheduled for September 2025. A strong, diverse Board is essential to representing the school community effectively.

I hope you have an enjoyable time over Christmas with your families.

# A reflection of the Pizza unit - Year 10

Our main aim for this year in Food Technology was to make a particular product for the end user, which was pizzas.

To start it off, I had to do a little research about the pizza, such as where it originated from and a little history of it. I put all the information I had found onto a timeline so that I know how it evolved from the past basic bread with sauce pizza to the modern day pizza. It has really helped me to understand more about pizza.

I was able to make this pizza in Saint Johns' College kitchen in 2024. I think the reason we made the pizza was to test my culinary skills. We were to make this for someone else in school and my team chose Mr Park (Y10 Dean) whom I was glad to cook for. Our aim was to make a product that suits the end user's needs, so we had to consider what our end user had to say and maybe add something on our own to make it more delicious and creative.

The next part was to make the pizza, in which I had no experience, but we were told to do a basic recipe of pizza. So I could know the basic recipe and components to making the pizza. We cleaned the kitchen to make sure it was safe and clean. Then we moved onto the trials. Trial 1 was pretty easy but a bit complex, because we had to modify the product to the end user's needs. But, it was easy at the end of the day because we had already done this basic recipe. The trial 2 was the same overall but I had to make sure everything was correct and was made to perfection.

The final production was the most challenging part because we had to make sure every step and every part of the pizza was built to perfection and it is what our end user asked us to make. I had to think about time management so we could finish and deliver it in time. We did this by organising our team (King's pizzeria) into groups. For example, on the day my partner collected all the ingredients to make the pizza while I started preparing the kitchen to make the product. Overall, this was a great experience cooking in a kitchen and I got to know how hard it was to cook for someone who wanted something that they like, not like a basic recipe.

In conclusion, my experience in the 2024 Saint John's College Food Technology kitchen has helped me to develop my kitchen skills which includes kneading and rolling the pizza dough and many more skills that I never knew. This has also improved my teamwork skills, and it would have been way harder to do without my partners. Overall, this was really a great experience and gave me beautiful memories to remember my school by and I will never forget it in my life.

They will participate in lectures, labs, and field trips across various subjects. Alongside physics, chemistry, biology, applied mathematics, and psychology, they will explore topics like molecular biology, biomedical engineering, nutrition, electronics/robotics, built environment, and more.

In addition to the academic modules, there will be opportunities for social and personal growth activities. The 14-day experience will culminate in a formal dinner, where students will have the chance to meet guests from participating Rotary Clubs, the science and technology communities, and industry leaders.

#### **Uniform FAQs**

Where do I buy SCHOOL uniform? NZ Uniform in Tristram Street is your one stop shop for ALL day to day school uniform, including PE uniform. They provide online shopping, have a booking service for fittings, run a Uniform Club, have AfterPay and Zip payment options, and will do specialist fittings for really small or really large students.

Where do I buy SPORTS uniform? New parents don't need to rush into sports uniform purchases - you'll have time once your son registers for teams to get the right information about uniform requirements. Unlike many schools, St John's supplies most of our playing uniforms - that makes sport cheaper for parents and also means our players look like a team on field. This approach works well for some codes, but not so well for others - depending on the particular uniform. As a rule of thumb, we'll supply playing shirts for most codes, while parents purchase shorts and socks. Kukri sponsors our school and they hold a range of playing shorts and team socks in their retail store - rugby, football, hockey, touch and other codes that play in shorts will purchase these from Kukri. Cricket shirts, pants and caps are also purchased direct from Kukri.

Where do I buy ie-lavalava? Buy these from the College Office for \$61. A full range of sizes are held there.

Can we buy 2nd Hand Uniform? Yes, we have a volunteer parent who runs a 2nd hand 'online' service throughout the year, and will open for drop-in buying in the Atrium from 11am - 2pm on Wednesday 22 January 2025. Online purchases at http://www.stjohns-hamilton.school.nz/ Second-Hand-Uniform. Online bookings are forwarded and you will be contacted about whether we can fill your order.

#### **Tū Manawa Active Aotearoa**



We gained funding from Sport NZ to run a Te Ao Māori programme based around physical activity in the 11 primary schools from the Waikato Catholic Kāhui Ako. Sixteen students from the Whānau Ope ranging from Year 10 to 13 were trained by Matua Jordan in haka, waiata, poi, raakau and tiititoorea.

Our taitama then did an awesome job teaching the Te Ao Māori Programme to 11 kura during Terms 2 and 3. We also has 10 kura come to St John's College for a day programme in Term 2. This kaupapa worked towards the Waikato Catholic Kāhui Ako; Te Hui Ahurea Cultural Festival in late August.

In Term 4 we finished the programme with visits to marae so schools could build on mana whenua connections. Our students were amazing ambassadors for Hato Hoani and built strong connections with our contributing kura.

Thanks to the generosity of our guests and donated auctions items and raffles we are pleased to report that more than \$30,000 was raised for the foundation - an excellent result. We are planning on holding the Race Day again in 2025 and look forward to seeing even more of our St John's families attend. Race Day funds will go towards continuing to build our endowment fund

In other news, we are looking to bring a couple of patrons onto the Foundation. They will replace Sir Patrick Hogan and Brother Colin Devane and we are excited about the opportunities we have to connect with some leading community figures and the support and opportunities they can provide the Foundation. It is so pleasing to hear the language of Marist Man - that of Faith, Integrity and Service being used by the students. This year has seen a huge increase in students aiming for Marist Man - particularly in Year 9 where double the number of students have worked towards this award. Overall, there has been an increase of 13% from 2023 and 116% since 2022.

There are a number of students who have explicitly said they want to achieve this award for each year they are

here. 2024 saw the first group of boys who have achieved Marist Man every year since its inception in 2022, so three years in a row. These boys were awarded the Marist Man Supreme Award. This can only be awarded to those students who achieved the award in Year 13 and have met the requirements for a minimum of 3 years.
